And so, with promises of corp
ral punishment and with a wild look in his eye, Victor dedicates a song to "the mermaids of the ight" and rips the cork off a ne tune from his second CD, "Vil-lainy Rewarded."

The crowd launches into a pirate dance that's a combinati of a Highland jig, the pogo and a square dance held on the rolling deck of a boat lost on the high
